The pandemic has forced us to miss many experiences which were a norm in our lives earlier.. 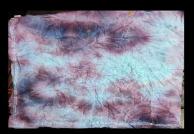

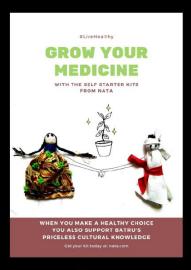
Everyday as a Playground

Students identified local problems and needs from everyday life and applied design thinking methodologies to transform problems into design opportunities.

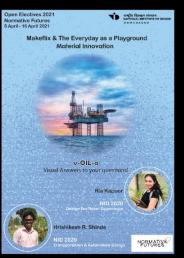




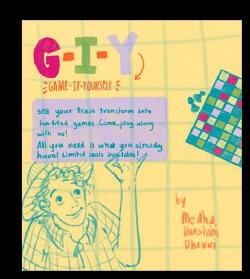

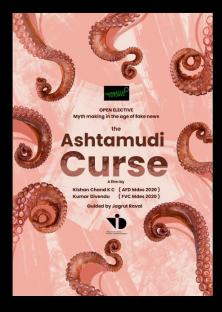
#### MYTH MAKING IN THE AGE OF FAKE NEWS

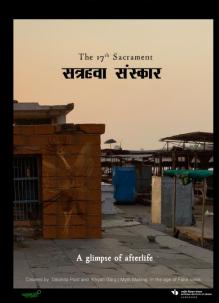

This elective aims to establish a relationship of mythology with our socio-political environment more so than ever before in contemporary India in 2021.

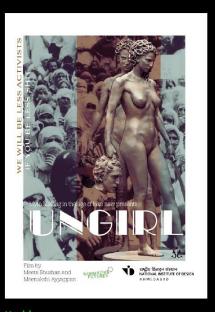




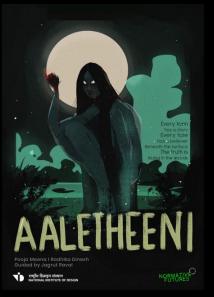

### Visualizing the Invisible

Art, Design and Public Health

Instructors: Dr. Sria Chatterjee and MSc. Gabriela Aquije

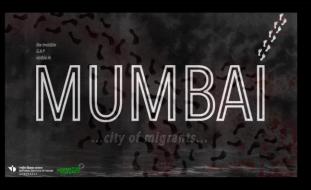
The international digital project, Visualizing the Virus, is an interactive platform that showcases and investigates the diverse ways in which the coronavirus is visualized, imagined, and the inequalities it makes visible.

Defining visualization in the broadest sense, the project explores representations of the virus and especially the disparities, histories, and futures its existence shows us.

The workshop focused on design's relationship to the politics of care and the local and global inequalities made visible by the Covid19 pandemic.

Taking the project Visualizing the Virus as a starting point, we developed practice-based research methods, as well as urban and digital ethnography strategies to make perceptible interdisciplinary phenomena.

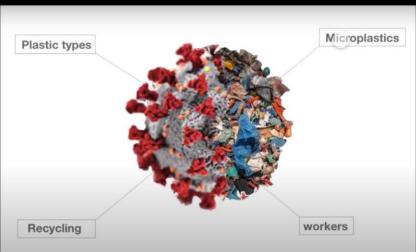

#### Vulnerable Machines

Rethink and redesign the human - robot interaction

Explore the interaction between human-machine under the hypothesis that the industrial robots are vulnerable and fragile machines. Throughout history and pop culture the idea of robots as superhumans: study, durable, error-free and tireless has been sold to us; however the reality is the opposite. # Wiring the flexible future through tana bana

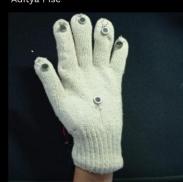
